'Confessions of a Thread Sketching Addict'

After exploring many different styles of art, craft and sewing, and a career as a professional musician, Deborah's raison d'être now lies in thread sketching, textile arts and education. Deborah will take you on her journey down the thread sketching and art quilting 'path', sharing some of her techniques and ideas, including how she draws inspiration and designs from her photography and travels, and applies them with fabric and stitch. AQA BLOCK A MONTH GIFT QUILT PROGRAM


Each month we will supply a different block pattern that you can make and donate to the Gift Quilt Program. These will then be put together and donated to those more needy. Each month the number of blocks or quilts donated will be recorded and at the December Meeting a major prize will be drawn - one entry for each block handed in.

February Block—Masculine Irish Chain

Cut from Green or Brown Material—five 3 1/2" squares from Blue material—four 3 1/2" squares one 9 1/2" square

Make a nine patch block with the nine small squares.

Hand in both squares together; they can be made up as illustrated.



(1) PREZZY - Mary Vassos. Mary made this one "quilt-as-you-go" for the gift quilts, and it is just right for the gift giving season. The blocks look like beautifully wrapped presents; Christmas, Easter and Birthday fabrics make the wrapping with contrasting fabric as the most elegant bows. A little girl would love this quilt.

(2a, b, c) These three quilts are part of the blue and white P's and Q's challenge for the 2015 Exhibition.

(2a) WHEN YOU SEE THIS, REMEMBER ME - Liz Willing Pentagons arranged around a central medallion featuring an exquisite doily also in blue and white. It is lovely to see these family embroideries used in a quilt. Paper pieced and appliquéd. Made between July and December 2015.

(2b) TILES IN DELFT - Maureen Mackie. Maureen has used white to separate fabric shapes. It accents the medley of blue fabrics very well. Needle turn applique with hand quilting. Made between August and November 2015

(2c) GONE WITH THE WIND - Judy Robinson- Whitty. The title says it all. Machine appliqué and machine quilted. Made between July and November 2015. Maureen's and Judy's quilts were voted first and second prize in the challenge. Congratulations to both of you.

(3) PLAYING INSIDE THE HEXAGONS - Jill Galvin Jill started this guilt ages ago and recently returned to complete these stunning hexagons. It has such a variety of Liberty fabrics and always something different to catch the eye, with both the

colour and shapes in the piecing. Green prints with a touch of yellow are used to great effect. This must have been an interesting quilt to make; choosing the fabrics for each hexagon and then the fun part of arranging them in a pleasing pattern. Professionally quilted by "The Quilting Bug".

(4) FINISHED - Jan Mac. A donated quilt has been divided to make two quilts. Machine pieced and quilted. Made between June and November 2015.

(5) LITTLE GIRLS - Marg Coulthard. Made by Marg and quilted by Jan Mac for the gift quilts. Hand appliquéd and machine quilted. Made between June and November 2015. 10

(6) RIBBONS OF LOVE - Susan King. Susan made this quilt for her precious 6th grandson, Liam, born 28/10/2015. (They are all precious, of course, as all grandmothers will attest!) Strips of fabric are sewn to create a woven and very stylish, modern effect. Machine pieced and hand quilted to include his name in the quilting. Made between October and December 2015.

(7) MEMORIES OF SUMMER - Jan Dods. This guilt uses strips of Kaffe Fasset scraps. It is a gift for a son and daughter-in-law to remember being together at the beach over many summers. Those scraps are never wasted, are they? Machine pieced and professionally quilted by "Sewn And Quilted". Made between

(8) HELEN'S HEXAGONS - Roslyn Robinson. This quilt pattern by Julie Wallace was given to Ros by her friend, Helen. It was to help Ros as she went through breast cancer treatment. The quilt is made using Japanese fabrics and hand pieced and hand quilted. Completed October 2015. Most of us would agree that our quilts are not merely chores to finish, but affairs of the heart which inspire us, and give us hope, and help us in particularly difficult circumstances. We all need our quilting more than we realize; as a creative project can distract our minds from worry, lower stress levels, and nourish the soul. Quilting can help us heal as we build with love

(9) BYE BYE BLACKBIRD - Anne Cocks. This very modern quilt in contemporary fabrics is made from a pattern in Quiltmania. (The magazine we all like to sigh over) It would not be a quilt by Anne without a touch of orange. Anything with birds in it always catches the eye, and in black they are silhouetted against the lighter


lime green, greys and creams. Machine pieced and professionally quilted by Pam Hammer at "Threadshed Quilting".

(10) ADVENT CALENDAR - Robyn Packham. Robyn has used a Christmas panel and has modified the pockets so she can actually put small gifts in them. A panel can be a great time saver. The little adjustments that are made can put one's own stamp on the project. Machine pieced and machine guilted in November 2015.

(11) SUMMER SKY - Helen Gammon. This beautiful subdued blue quilt definitely received the aaaahhhhh of approval at S & T. It is made from a Moda Jelly Roll, and the pattern from a book of Jelly Roll quilts. Helen made this for a friend who loves to spend summer at the beach. Machine pieced and professionally guilted by Alison Bacon. Made between January and December 2015.



(12) SNOW GUMS IN WINTER - Janet Kidson. This guilt is one of a series of six representing "Ice". Janet has spray bleached black cotton fabric using gum leaves to create a silhouette. The resulting patterns are then over stitched with metallic thread and glitter is added. It certainly sparkles just like the sun on ice. This piece has been to exhibitions in Geelong and Adelaide. It is always such a treat to see the continuing instalments of Janet's wonderful art quilts. Our Art Quilt members are doing a great job of producing prizewinning quilts. The techniques used are many and varied. Their members are very willing to share skills and techniques. Keep your eyes on the newsletter for notifications.

13 (13) BUSH CHRISTMAS - Judy Robinson-Whitty. Judy has used Lisa Chandler fabric to make a table runner as a family gift. These fabrics always look spectacular. Machine pieced and guilted.

(14a) BRUNHILDA'S BRA - Judy Robinson-Whitty. These blocks were commenced in a Wedge Ruler class with Chris Serong. The name of the quilt seems quite obscure. Are we being transported to Operatic Delights? No! One look at the table runner at S & T and we immediately laughed and understood the context. Judy, we love your sense of humour. (Chris, we will never be able to look at this block in quite the same way again. Sorry.) Machine pieced and quilted between July and November 2015.l

(14b) CHRISTMAS STAR - Judy Robinson-Whitty. This table runner was 15 made at a Mary Hitchen's workshop. The resulting orphan blocks are finally put into a gift for a friend. Hand pieced and machine quilted between September and November 2015.

(15)TEDDY BEARS - Marg Coulthard. This quilt top was done in buttonhole stitched appliqu by Marg and machine quilted by Jan Mac for the gift quilts. Lots of Teddy love for a little child in this guilt. Made between August and December.

(16) KRIS KRINGLE - Jill Galvin. A quilt in Japanese fabric squares and

16 sashing, and striped posts to add contrast looks very elegant. The Japanese fabric designs always look stunning whatever blocks are used. This looks great and is a striking gift for Jill's son-in-law. 20b When we see Japanese fabrics there is something about them that draws us to look at them more closely. The Japanese people have an artistic sensibility and expression as a way of life. Beauty is seen in the simplest things, and appreciated.

We could do well to look more carefully around us to appreciate what we see in everyday life. We need to slow down the hectic pace of life and be mindful of what we see and what we are doing.

(17) GRANNY SQUARES QUILT - Pam Gladstones. Pam has used a Jelly Roll in batiks mainly in tones of purple and green squares to make a very dramatic quilt. It is hand pieced and quilted. Made between March and December 2015.

arranged in a honeycomb pattern. The white background accentuates the bright colours and the centres are all pale yellow. The small shapes between the blocks is a small-print black and white fabric which is also used for the borders. It is

(18) HEXIE LEXI - Mary Vassos. This quilt is paper pieced 2inch hexagons

refreshing to see this traditional quilt made in bright colours. Mary fortuitously found a Double Wedding Ring cheater fabric for the back for \$5 at the op shop. Professionally quilted by Pam Hammer at "Threadshed Quilting". Made between August and November 2015.

(19) JAMES' SANTA SACK - Prue Townley. For Prue this is now a family tradition. This is the fourth Santa Sack she has made. James is Prue's great nephew and it is for his first Christmas. This is such a special gift from Great Auntie Prue. Made between October and November 2015.

(20a) DARK PINWHEELS - Prue Townley; (20b) HEXAGONS AND STARS - Prue Townley

These two quilts were made at Prue's first Symposium in 2006. In a Lessa Siegele class two contrasting fabric strips were joined, then 60 degree triangles were cut, and their placement determined the outcome. The first quilt made pinwheels and the second quilt revealed hexagons and stars. Lessa is a great teacher. AQA members have gained great skills and ideas from her classes. This UFO from 2006 came back to life this year and the two quilts were completed between September and November 2015. Both machine pieced and professionally quilted by Pam Hammer at "Threadshed Quilting".

(21) - JESS' BABY QUILT - Prue Townley. Prue has designed a quilt with love for a new baby due in February to her second cousin. A Judy Newman pattern "Saville Row" has been used and the fabric choices and colours were determined by the perfect border fabric. Made between September and November 2015. Professionally quilted by Pam Hammer at "Threadshed Quilting". (continued Page 8)



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GUEST SPEAKER FOR DECEMBER - SARAH GULLY



As a pre Christmas speaker we couldn't have done better than Sarah Gully, and her daughter Lila, sharing their delightful toys with us and perhaps inspiring some to try their hand at making a toy for that special small person in their life. I did, however, get the distinct impression that Sarah's delightful vintage style dolls and animal toys could be equally loved by those of us who are young at heart.

Sarah comes from a crafty family; a family always making, be it clothing or sculpted heads made using white clay collected from beaches while on holiday.

Sarah, who describes herself as a Dollmaker/Textile Artist, studied painting and print making at the Victorian College for the Arts, ran a shop for some years and then in 1999 fulfilled a lifelong dream and travelled to Japan. She had a 12 month contract, but stayed for 6 years.

It was in Japan she found that the snobbery surrounding the Art vs. Craft debate just does not exist. Instead the making of beautiful things for the world is highly valued. An example - many Japanese send out Happy New Year cards which they have printed from their own hand-carved wood block. She describes art as intellectual and craft as making and feeding our imaginative side is very important.

On her return to Melbourne Sarah began exhibiting again and soon diversified into dolls and toys. She designs her pieces and makes her own patterns; the hand embroidered faces are a special feature. In many instances she uses vintage fabric [in fact she dreams about vintage fabric]; her doll and toy designs are inspired by old styles which she revives with a new approach.


Sarah teaches at the Council for Adult Education in the city and also recommends a visit to Craft Victoria in Flinders Lane – it is "worth popping in" to see what is happening. She has also had a 4 page feature spread appear in "Stuffed Magazine" published by Stampington.

We were treated to a show of her lovely work. We saw a rabbit type animal with long ears, several dolls with beautifully embroidered faces and a Frida Kahlo doll (a famed Mexican artist of the 40's famous for her 'monobrow').

The Scottish Diaspora Tapestry acknowledges the migration of Scots and their culture around the globe with 300 individually made panels telling stories of Scottish events, Scottish innovators and adventurers. The Scottish Government launched the project in 2012 and it consists of over 90 metres of panels featuring stitcheries from all around the world, in a similar style to the Bayeux Tapestry panels.

Australian Panels include: The First Fleet, Saint Mary MacKillop, and Ten Pound Passage
The project was designed to involve communities around the world in celebration
of Scottish heritage and culture, the people and places which connect Scotland to its

global diaspora (ie. the dispersion of people from their homeland).

Scots have migrated all over the world and have often had a profound impact on the areas where they settled. This project brought together stories from more than such communities, documenting their Scottish connections in more than 300 embroidered panels. It is a remarkable and heart-felt homage to the determination, courage and achievement of Scottish migrants and their descendants across the centuries.

AQIPP 2015 Exhibition "Light and Life" - Final Report

Planning for AQIPP 2015 commenced in April 2014. A committee was formed consisting of Heather Bingham, Jann Haggart, Marina Holland, Julie Langford, Noelle Lyon, Jacie Malseed and Jane Rogers with Janet Kidson as convenor.

Once again we were delighted to be invited as guest exhibitors to the Whitehorse Artspace. Our theme for this exhibition was "Light and Life" following the United Nations theme for 2015.

The first tasks were gaining sponsorships and setting up advertising for the exhibition. Our major sponsor was Brother International and the other sponsors were Australian Quilters Association Inc., Embroidery Source, GJs Discount Fabrics, Kraftkolour, Reece Scannell and Victorian Textiles and we thank them for their support. Brother International offered and undertook to do our printing for flyers and the catalogue.

A flyer was designed by Noelle Lyon. The catalogue was designed by Whitehorse Design Department in collaboration with Jacquie Nichols-Reeves and Heather Bingham. An article was prepared by Janet and Mal Kidson which illustrated the event using photographs from AQIPP 2013 and was published in the June 2015 edition of "Australian Quilts Down Under" which advertised AQIPP 2015. Other advertising opportunities were taken up wherever possible. Two external AQA "Quilt Show" banners and one AQIPP internal banner were prepared and purchased and were displayed during the exhibition..

The committee was expanded in early 2015 by the arrival of Anne Cocks, Jolana Jordan, Mary Parrish and Judy Robinson-Whitty following the withdrawal of Jann Haggart, Noelle Lyon and Jane Rogers. Marina kept the minutes, Heather planned the book, and other work was dealt with by committee members as required and as requested by me.

The exhibition opened on Thursday 12th November, closed on Tuesday 22nd December and take-down was on the following day. The judges were Jann Fraser and Olga Walters. Jacquie Nicholls-Reeves again curated the exhibition with the help of Gillian McCarthy and the Artspace team. Throughout the exhibition we were supported by both Whitehorse Council and staff.

There were 38 entries mostly from Victoria but we were pleased to see quilts also from ACT, NSW, SA, Qld and WA. It was great to see that past entrants again supporting us. The standard of quilts was high and covered a diversity of interpretations of the exhibition theme. Our group worked with the Artspace team to hang the quilts, the hanging being quite a challenge, and the outcome was a well-balanced display. Opening Night went very smoothly with Kaye Hardman as master of ceremonies. Jacquie Nichols-Reeves opened the exhibition. Our Judges both spoke about the exhibition and commented particularly on the quality and diversity of quilts and the importance of this exhibition as an Australian contemporary Quilting event.

All but one award winner or representative were able to attend Opening Night. Sue Dennis, who was in Mongolia at the time, was unable to attend.

A group quilt "Spring Time" was made by fourteen AQA members as a donation quilt and this was presented to The City of Whitehorse. It was gratefully accepted and will go to Japan as a gift as part of the special Sister City celebration in May 2016. It is 45 years since this Sister City relationship, the first in Australia, was forged between the former City of Box Hill and City of Matsudo, in the Chiba Prefecture of Japan.

As in previous years advertised Saturday-afternoon demonstrations were held and our two judges kindly participated in two of these. Members of the AQA Gift Quilt team attended these Saturday-afternoon events and provided public demonstrations of their activities. Heather Bingham again produced for sale an excellent book of images of the quilts that were hung in this exhibition. A copy was donated to the AQA Library, to Karyn Thomas [Brother International] and to the City of Whitehorse.

Special thanks go to Karyn Thomas, Brother International, for the Brother sponsorship and for her other contributions to the success of this exhibition and to Jacquie Nichols-Reeves and the Whitehorse people who have been a pleasure to work with, to AQA, to Kaye Hardman for her encouragement and support at all stages, and, of course, to past and present AQIPP Committee members without whom these AQIPP Exhibitions would not have been possible.

A financial report has been prepared separately for AQA.

After the return of quilts to exhibitors I step down as Convenor and as a committee member of AQIPP. I offer the incoming AQIPP committee my very best wishes. I hope they will enjoy the challenge and their involvement in Australian Quilts in Public Places as much as I have.
