Library: From Tracey: New books have arrived and will be ready for next month. Stocktake will be in June. **Gift Quilts:** Faye and Elaine said thanks to everyone who has returned blocks, quilts etc. Use of a new cupboard (out the back!) enables the quilts etc. to be reorganised. We are now under the 60 mark — which has been a wonderful effort by all.

Bags for Impact ladies. Cut outs will be at the February Sit n Sew. At the March Sit n Sew, Elaine will demonstrate how to make the bags, so come and help with the sewing. 14inch zips are needed and there are available at Theo's. Longer zips can also be used. April meeting, Kathy Kaplan (from Impact) will be coming, so let's get some bags made to be able to give her then. Instructions for the bags are on the NoodleHead site, or Faye has instructions for anyone who wants them. Fabric is available out the back if anyone wishes to use it.

Exhibitions/Symposiums: Shirley told us next Exhibition meeting is next week. The exhibition is the Saturday and Sunday of the 1st weekend in September. We are looking at the possibility of making it a 3 day exhibition, however we are still working on that – we would really like to include the Friday, however we are still working with Box Hill Town Hall about that. AQA BLOCK A MONTH GIFT QUILT PROGRAM

Each month we will supply a different block pattern that you can make and donate to the Gift Quilt Program. These will then be put together and donated to those more needy. Each month the number of blocks or quilts donated will be recorded and at the December Meeting a major prize will be drawn - one entry for each block handed in.

March Block—Whirling Geese

Finished Size: 9" x 9"

Cutting Instructions: Red Fabric—4 rectangles 3 1/2" x 6 1/2" (1A)

Black—1 square 3 1/2" x 3 1/2" (2B)

Black Print—8 squares 3 1/2" x 3 1/2" (2C)

Assembly Instructions

Step 1. Draw diagonal line on wrong side of black print 31/2" square. Referring to Diagram I, place marked square on red rectangle, right sides together, aligning raw edges. Stitch on drawn line; trim away and discard excess fabric. Open and press. Repeat on opposite corner to make pieced rectangle. Make 4.

Step 2. Referring to Diagram II, join pieced rectangle and black square using a partial seam. Sew from edge to middle of black square and backstitch.

Step 3. Add 2 more pieced rectangles (Diagram III).

Step 4. Join last pieced rectangle along long side. Sew from outside of block to partial seam created in Step 1 to create

Desley Maisano - Addicted To Quilts

Desley is a professional machine quilter and a passionate quilt maker. To her the quilting is the part of the quilt making process that she enjoys the most. She approaches each quilt she makes thinking first about how she will quilt it, often before the first fabric is selected and cut. Desley will bring along many of her quilts -- not just the Show Quilt, but also quilts borrowed from her family's beds. She will also share her thoughts and inspirations on the quilting process.

A COUNTRY CHAT VALDA MARTIN

Shiny red Gala apples, glowing clingstone peaches, purple plums and soft brown figs are through our orchard shed weekly now. To follow will be Golden Delicious, green Granny Smiths and the different colours of Pink Lady, Jonathon and Red Delicious apples. The Autumn Giant plums are gaining the size that their name suggests. The ripening quinces are like bright stars showing their colour contrasting against the darkness of their leaves.

The farm received nearly three inches of rain recently and there is green grass in the paddocks which the sheep and lambs are enjoying.

So colour is everywhere on the orchard trees. One of the most amazing designs and creations though must be the flower of the passionfruit (my garden has a rampart Banana passionfruit). Please search for a flower and examine it. There are so many design aspects to it and colour. May be previously I have written on a similar vein about sunflowers. They are so different in design, colour and size. Examine every flower for their beauty and uniqueness. Some of our fabric designers, eg Leesa Chandler, work hard to recognise the unique qualities and colours of our Australian flowers and leaves and to have them printed in the correct colours. She will be having a week long exhibition at Cranbourne Botanical Gardens soon.

Delightful news. The National Gallery of Victoria has announced the dates from July to November for "How to make an Australian Quilt. The best news for AQA is that the "Elizabeth quilt" will be on show. Quite a number of AQA members availed themselves of Pam Hammers huge effort to gain approval for us to produce replicas and she provided templates and instructions. The original is now in the possession of the NGV.

Our first quilt (1) was a tiny doll house quilt made by Olga Walters for her doll's










"Scottish Pines" (12) has maker unknown and was purchased in the USA.






























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'Impact' Domestic Violence Support

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GUEST SPEAKER FOR FEBRUARY — DEBORAH WIRSU



Deborah Wirsu, our very own member, was February's speaker; a thoroughly talented quilt artist, thread sketching/painting aficionado and professional musician. A lady who by her own admission arrives belatedly at many of her endeavours but succeeds in her pursuits. She began her musical relationship with the viola at the grand old age of 16, however, this did not hinder her subsequent move to the status of a professional musician with the opera and ballet orchestra Melbourne and a teacher of the viola. Deborah describes her career as neither exotic nor bohemian; her mother did not view these endeavours as *real* jobs.

Fourteen years of teaching children the viola left Deborah "burnt out" and in search of a refresher, pick me up or new direction – six years later she 'discovered' textiles. She was by no means

totally unfamiliar with textiles or an inexperienced stitcher. Deborah didn't learn at her Grandmother's knee; her mentor was her professional dressmaker aunt. A lady who was particular about quality and her ethos and teachings are now very apparent in Deborah's work. As a child she stitched 'anything and everything', but never really found her own particular perfect 'fit'.

As a late comer to textile art she has well and truly recovered any perceived lost ground and interestingly Deborah sees a firm link between music and art in that both require visual thinking in the planning, execution and delivery in order to portray emotions and atmosphere.

She began her foray into textiles with free standing dolls, bags and tiny 6 x 9 cm treasures. During this period she was feeling her way and searching for *her* comfort zone. As is often the case that comfort zone arrived with a bang. Two workshops with Julie Haddrick at Adelaide's Patchwork by the Sea captivated her; she was hooked and has never looked back...she has found that niche and has shaped it into her very own. She has also completed an online City and Guilds Course.

Throughout her presentation Deborah had been quite self - deprecating of her abilities and skills but as soon as the *real* show and tell of her work began we, the audience, knew we were looking at something special; were totally captivated and in awe of her beautiful creations. A better description would be *gobsmacked*; her work is absolutely stunning! Just some of her works were:

- 1. Norfolk Island Pine her first zig zag stitching and a bit like Harry Potter it has been hidden in the cupboard for a while.
- 2. Banksia Hideaway beautiful blue wrens in a banksia [a judge commented that it's "good to know when to stop"]. The stitching is amazing.
- 3. Sea Star an almost 3D creation on a background of solvy and organza
- 4. Sunset about 4 x 8 in yellows, blue and black
- 5. Cockie a commission which was digitally printed on silk and then given the Deborah treatment.
- 6. An evening bag of layered cotton/organza, thread sketched with white leaves on a fabric collage background.
- 7. An example [a poppy] of Deborah's stained glass window style. Unlike the black bias technique with which we are familiar, this beautiful creation featured black outlines of various widths which seemed to peek out from within the rich coloured flower which had in turn been stitched to within an inch of its life. Deborah describes this as free-style stained glass.
- 8. Blue hands playing a piano. This was created using a photo which she then photo shopped and free stitched.
- 9. A collage background of gentle and muted 'summery' shades which was then oversewn or thread sketched with delicate hay stalks.

My pedestrian descriptions do no justice whatsoever to Deborah's work.

Deborah has a broad repertoire of techniques from which to draw and incorporate in her work. She says that she likes to work quickly and spontaneously, but on close inspection it is obvious that there is a great deal of thought and care in every single stitch. Free stitching does not mean 'careless' or without purpose...these works are well planned and executed. Some of her preferred 'tools' are Hing Ping brand rayon thread, soluble fabric, stabilizers, dressmakers interfacing; she is currently trialling dressmakers woven interfacing.

During 2015 Deborah ran her own online thread sketching site/blog. She endeavoured to produce one video of a thread sketched piece for each week of the year; an amazing commitment and achievement of 52 pieces of art. Her 2016 target is one piece every fortnight. Apart from these endeavours her work has featured in publications including Quilting Arts [an American publication] and Quilters Companion - Waratah Dancing featured her freestyle stained glass technique. To close Deborah spoke about her 2015 AQIPP entry. She began with a painting and a dyed fabric background which she overlaid with rotary cut slivers of fabric. She free cut the dead tree using wobbly pieces/shapes. The background was zigzagged and thread sketched; the whole used 1000's of metres of thread in various colours and shades. Thank you so very much to Deborah for her inspiring and thought provoking presentation.

In closing, "do yourself a favour "; if you have access to the internet check out Deborah's website – www.deborahwirsu.com You won't be disappointed; I am sure you will be just as awestruck as I was viewing her beautiful work and concepts.

EXHIBITION REVIEW

The Scottish Diaspora Embroideries

These have been on display in the Albury Library Gallery during most of February. The project was initiated by the Prestoun Grange Arts Festival Team to celebrate the 2014 Homecoming—an event which is held every five years to welcome home Scottish emigrants who are visiting. Appeals were sent out to Historical Societies, Embroidery Groups etc in all countries where Scots had migrated. These groups were asked to design what they wanted to convey, the designs were vetted and redrawn in the same style (to ensure the integrity of the exhibition—all were designed on the basis of a circle and the points of the compass, and with similar representations of the men and women included) and the groups were supplied with a square of linen with the design on, and all threads (mostly wool). They were then left to develop the designs according to their own taste. Over 1000 stitchers from 34 countries took part. Some countries, such as Australia and Canada, had sent a large number of entries; others such a Pakistan, only one or two.

It was fascinating to see how the embroiderers had used different stitches and techniques to render texture (tweed, fur, hair, the curled poll of a Hereford bull, gold thread knots for gold dust in the pan) and colour (including tartans).
