AQA BLOCK A MONTH GIFT QUILT PROGRAM

Each month we will supply a different block pattern that you can make and donate to the Gift Quilt Program. These will then be put together and donated to those more needy. Each month the number of blocks or quilts donated will be


recorded and at the December Meeting a major prize will be drawn - one entry for each block handed in.

May Block—Striped Square

Cut eight 6 1/2" squares from striped fabric, with the stripes matching on each square.

(I have only drawn one stripe, but you can see the idea.)





Put the squares together in pairs, right sides together, matching the stripes carefully.


Draw a line across one diagonal; sew 1/4" from the line on each side.

Cut along the line and open out the pieces, pressing seams carefully. Trim back to 5 1/2", matching stripes.

You should have two sets of four of these; sew them together as a four-patch, matching stripes carefully.

(I'm sorry, but my computer went on strike at this point, and I can't get the last corner in—but you can see what it should look like.)

The square should measure 10 1/2" (10" finished).

The smallest was "The Four Sisters Exhibition" at Violet Town, shown for three days early in April.

Barbara Toogood; Jo Malham was to be present the next 2 days. So firstly I congratulate these artistic sisters for working together and secondly for the variety and quality of their work. Shown previously at Point Lonsdale then Violet Town the Exhibition will be shown at venues nearest the other two sisters soon.

A bigger event for me was a whole day – from 6.15am to 6.45pm on a Mystery Bus trip to seven patchwork venues spread from Carrum Downs to Monbulk. Each shop had its own personality and temptation for retail therapy was definitely allowed!





SHOW AND TELL




(1) ELECTRIC PIANO - Kate Potocnik. Kate received a commission from a family friend to make a cover for her new electric piano. This a good example of how to use up lots of smaller pieces to create the background in one colour way and the main subject in another colour. The main subject of the guilt, the piano, is featured in bright and cheerful reds. To complete the effect a piece of music is appliqued over the piano. Maxine pieced and quilted in March 2016.





(4) FIRST QUILT - Amy Price (aged 10). Grandma Jean said she would teach Amy to make a quilt. With her help with cutting out the squares and instructions on how to use the machine, the quilt was made over three afternoons. Grandma pressed and unpicked where necessary. A great effort, Amy. We enjoyed hearing about your first quilt and look forward to seeing the next one. Machine pieced by Amy and professionally guilted by Pam Hammer. Completed between January and March 2016.



(6) IRISH BLESSINGS - Jan Dods. Jan's American relatives sent her a silver dish engraved with an Irish Blessing. This led to the Irish theme of this quilt. The floral fabric Jan had chosen reminded her husband of roses in Ireland. The pattern she chose resembles a Celtic cross. The Irish roses and the Celtic cross are linked in her memories. After her husband died the project was put away for a few years until she was able to go back and complete the quilt. These special projects come

from the heart. Machine pieced and professionally quilted at "Sewn and Quilted" shop. Commenced in 2011 and finished in 2016.

(7) TEXAS STAR - Blanche Gibson. This beautiful quilt is made with Liberty fabrics. All the stars are hand pieced. It was a long but rewarding challenge to complete. We are delighted to see the result. Professionally guilted by her friend Desley. Commenced in 2015 and completed in 2016.

(8) SCRAP CHALLENGE - Margaret Grinton. Margaret's Scrapaholics group members each commenced a challenge quilt. Every month new instructions were given for the next step. To start they each had to make a 20 inch square which would be on point. Subsequent instructions specified what the next month's round would be. Margaret used an EQ7 program to draw up the pattern which would be a

mariner's star, foundation pieced, because she didn't like other patterns available. Making your own design is much better as it makes it unique. The monochromatic blues really look wonderful. Machine pieced and machine quilted over the summer. Commenced 2015 and completed April 2016.

(9) GHOST GUM - Lisa King. Lisa made this quilt for the Australian Textile Exhibition. The pattern is by Leesa Chandler and uses Leesa Chandler fabrics. This beautiful quilt is a birthday gift for her sister. Pieced by Lisa and machine quilted by Karen Styles. Commenced in September and completed in November 2016.

(10) - MY DEAR JANE - Marion Groom. Marion's stitching group all decided to start the Dear Jane quilt.

But only two people from the group have actually finished it. The maroon and dark green colours are very dramatic against the cream background. What a great quilt, Marion, and well worth all that work. Hand pieced. Commenced May 2014 and completed November 2014. That was only six months to do all that hand piecing. I would call that speed piecing. Finally quilted by Lyn Wright in March 2016.

Keep stitching everyone. We love to see what you are doing.

EXHIBITION 2016

The Exhibition Committee having been meeting monthly since late last year and things are well under way for a great Exhibition. The following are some points for you to note and put the dates into your diaries, phones, tablets etc.

Theme: Spring Song

Date: September 2nd—4th, 2016. Due to the Hall being double booked on the Thursday the stands will be erected late Thursday afternoon and the quilts will then be hung on Friday morning. The Exhibition will officially open at 1.00 pm on Friday.

Venue: Box Hill Town Hall, Whitehorse Road, Box Hill.

Raffle Quilt: Spring Song – designed, pieced and appliquéd by Chris Serong and Liz Willing. Long arm machine quilted by Helen Hayes.

Raffle Tickets will be handed out in June.

Challenge: A Christmas Table Runner measuring a maximum of 40 cms x 90 cms. Any technique and design can be used. The Table Runner must have three layers and be quilted and bound.

Shops have been booked and these will be announced in due course.

Entries: Each member may enter as many quilts as they wish but it is to be understood that only 1 - 2 will probably be hung depending on the numbers entered. The Challenge Runner is not considered as a quilt entry. Entry forms for Quilts and the Challenge will be in the Newsletter.

Quilt Bags: Each quilt will require its own cloth bag. The Exhibition Committee after consultation with the Executive and General Committee are organizing the making of some environmentally safe quilt bags with the AQA Logo and a pocket for your name and address on them. There are several colours and you will be notified when they are ready and available for sale. We expect them to sell for appro. \$7.00. Plastic bags can make your quilts sweat and they may be mistaken for rubbish – heaven forbid!

Help: Will be needed in lots of areas – kitchen, raffle ticket selling, entry table, white glove, setting up and taking down etc. **Watch This Space for Further Information** in newsletters running up to the Exhibition.

Guest Speaker for April—Kathy Kaplan



Over the last several months one of our ongoing collection projects has been aimed at Mothers day and Impact. Many people have contributed a variety of goods including toiletries, toilet bags (a special effort organised by Fay) teddies and booties. Kathy Kaplan OAM, founder of Impact came to our April meeting to accept our gifts and to speak about the work Impact does.

She began her presentation with a poem "I Got Flowers Today". In 2015 79 women were killed as a result of domestic violence; by week 13 of 2016 17 women had lost their lives. KPNG estimated that in 2009 domestic violence cost the community \$13.6 billion; more than the combined health and education budgets.

Kathy describes domestic violence as "an equal opportunity, non-discriminatory" problem. There is currently a lady in hiding from her husband, the CEO of one of Australia's largest corporations – and GP's through to the men holding the traffic signs are all represented on the perpetrators list. Abuse takes many forms other than physical attacks; emotional, psychological, religious, financial and social control or deprivation all constitute forms of domestic violence. It is a sad reality that domestic violence places, primarily women [there are men in abusive relationships too], in the position where it is necessary to flee their homes.

Women are 5 times safer walking alone at night than in their own homes. One in four children witness violence in the home. 85% of women report incidents of violence being inflicted upon pets.

The recently released Royal Commission report contained 227 recommendations two of which Kathy highlighted; the establishment of support and safety hubs ['one stop shop'] where women can access all forms of assistance and a change to privacy laws which currently restrict the sharing of information between agencies which help the abused and those in need of assistance.

Kathy also spoke about how she, a single mum of three children (five, three and eight weeks) ten years ago, was moved by ads for Mothers Day to try and make a difference to victims of domestic violence. Impact was established to make a difference; to work at arm's length by working through refuges.

More often than not women fleeing an abusive home leave without a thing and move to an area where they have no friends or contacts. Hampers of Love – Bags of Love was born to fill a void. These gifts are packed by volunteers and 750 hampers for Christmas and Mothers Day have been recently created – each valued between \$150 and \$300. 72 toy 'hampers' and also electrical appliance 'hampers' have also been packed. 17th April is the next packing day at the Glen Eira College. People from all walks of life volunteer on these days and any children who assist are recognised. Kathy contacts the child's school principal and sends a Certificate of Appreciation for presentation to that child.

Impact also arranges interest free loans – the loans have been for funeral costs, car keys (the lady had been given the car by her partner, but not the keys) and a little 8 year old boy who required eye surgery to enable him to read properly. About 50% of recipients manage to repay the loans.

Impact is currently fundraising to sponsor Safety Cards. These cards are worn either on or over clothing, are dynamically linked to GPS and the police and once activated record audio which is permissible evidence in court. Taskforce Alexis located at Moorabbin police is currently running a study of 40 such cards. Each card costs \$600 and \$40 per month activation fee. Impact hopes to run 15 cards for 12 months,

What can we do? Kathy says - Don't leave the matter here .. talk about abuse. Be involved – donate or come to Impact working bees and donate (either new goods or dollars). Or as Kathy put it "Do nothing or do something .. lend a hand".

Kathy also thanked us for our earlier gift of quilts and recorded the heart-warming reaction of the recipients to the Quilts. Impact is a totally volunteer run organisation and almost every single cent donated is used within the organisation. Kathy left us with much food for thought.

For all the Liberty addicts there was a talk at AQC by Peter Redding of Liberty who unveiled the new range of Liberty of London fabrics. Peter passed around sample books of the new range of Liberty fabrics, and held a slide show of some of the inspiration behind them. There are two collections released per year with 40 fabrics in each collection. Most of the manufacturing has been done in England although they do own a manufacturing plant in Italy. Unfortunately you may recall that before Christmas there were very severe floods in England and the Liberty factory was severely damaged and they are working around the clock to get it back in operation. 70% of their business is sales of Tana Lawn but one of the main ways they are expanding is through collaborations with for example, Nike, Uniglo, Lulu Lemon and our own Sea Folly. One of the anecdotes Peter told us is about how Liberty appeal to a very broad range of customers – recently he was in the lift at Liberty of London and on one side of him was a 78 year old lady from Stoke on Trent coming in to buy some buttons for her cardigan and on the other side was the pop princess Taylor Swift coming in to buy a coat! The Strawberry Thief - an on-line Liberty fabric store and wholesaler from Perth was supporting Peter, and Robyn showed us her lovely Liberty quilts (front and back). I suspect that Liberty is undergoing a bit of a resurgence in the quilting world! **Cindy Steer**

FROM THE EDITOR

Thoughts from the Past



EXHIBITION REVIEW

Mill Rose Cottage - Ballan




The weekend of 19-20 March was the annual Autumn Festival at Ballan. Last year Mill Rose Cottage hosted an exhibition of Japanese Quilts and this year we were treated to a display of the Red Cross Signature Quilts. The antique quilts [about 15 or so] were a privilege to see; they were made with love, hope and compassion. Dating from World War 1 era and including World War 2 and more contemporary examples all, except one, were in the red and white colours of the organisation. Some were frayed and stained, one was devoid of a centre and others ap-



peared to be originally a large tablecloth which served as the embroidery/signature background, but all had been created with overriding thoughts of loved ones. The contemporary quilts had been created by Branches or those associated with the Red Cross. The photo is of the centenary quilt made by the Ballan Branch; it was the second branch to open. One of the guilts was made by primary school children and the interesting feature was that the signatures had been laid out in the shapes of traditional patchwork blocks such as Ohio Star.

The big surprise for me was when I found that the one exception to the red and white colour way, an all white version, had been made by the Yarra Glen branch. I was amazed when I found that many members of my family had contributed to that white version; 3 whole blocks were signed exclusively by forebears and connections and I had that overwhelming thrill of emotion I had experienced when I discovered that my great aunt had signed the 1891 giant petition seeking Women's Suffrage. With the assistance of the white glove lady I was able to record, on a scrappy piece of paper, all the names of those forebears; I will pass that list and the photos I took onto my Mother and her cousin.
