Treasurer's report: The March statement is on the noticeboard and has been passed by the committee.

AQA BLOCK A MONTH GIFT QUILT PROGRAM

Each month we will supply a different block pattern that you can make and donate to the Gift Quilt Program. These will then be put together and donated to those more needy. Each month the number of blocks or quilts donated will be recorded and at the December Meeting a major prize will be drawn - one entry for each block handed in.

May Block — Maypole Dance

Cut four 4 1/2" by 2 1/2" rectangles of fabric A four 4 1/2" by 2 1/2" rectangles of fabric B four 2 1/2" squares of fabric A


Place a 2 1/2" square on one end of fabric B rectangle. Draw diagonal line as shown.

Sew along line; trim seam to 1/4". Press.

Join this unit to a rectangle of fabric A.
Repeat to make four 4 1/2" blocks.
Arrange as shown in completed block, and Join as a 4-patch.

Block should measure 8 1/2" (8" finished).

A COUNTRY CHAT VALDA MARTIN


Autumn has given a visual feast of colour this year. As I drive around our property at present the colours of the pin oak leaves remind me of bright red Bali fabrics, the reds, oranges, yellows and maroons melding together in unique patterns. Further on, nearly an acre of mixed coloured pumpkins are ready to be picked usually after the first frost. They vary from smooth grey Triambles to large slate grey ribbed skinned Queensland Blue. Dotted around are some Turkish Turbans, tri-coloured with a striped bump on the top, and small Golden Nuggets, these are prolific bearing and small, they

stand out with their brightness. The streaky yellow of the huge Styrian hull-less - Pepita pumpkins makes a bold statement in the patch. This is grown for the beautiful eating seed, either eaten fresh or dried and crushed.

My only brother from Mudgeeraba, Qld, visited us and re-lived a childhood experience. Mushrooming. We were as surprised as he to find in a back paddock two large, about 25 yards in diameter, perfect circles of mushrooms. His bucket was already full, so these "Fairy Circles" were left intact. Nature is a treasure trove of colour, soon we will see and photograph the red ones with their white dots, so popular for appliquéing or embroidering. Magic.

Near the house the Glory Vine is in competition with the tall, willowy Liquid Amber. The Sasangua camellia is covered in single pale pink flowers and is spectacular under the tall Japanese maple with its delicate leaves echoing the hues of the pin oaks but gracefully giving an umbrella of colour to it as well.

Away from the farm for our Retreat the variety of projects, fabrics and personalities was revitalising. It is always a joy to see the guilts that had been started or worked on at previous Retreats, finished. Colours again, well chosen and we all experienced our own visual feast, inside the sewing room!





The AQA Annual Retreat in Queenscliff was a festival of sewing, delicious food, friendship, shopping and laughter.

Even though we agreed that "What happens in Queenscliff stays in Queenscliff" I am spilling the beans on a very enjoyable weekend (except for the shopping... you will just have to experience how good that is for yourselves next year).

City and the country members and representatives from both the night and the day groups mingled, laughed, swapped stories, sauntered the 90 metres required to get cappuccinos and took turns with the "chores" (fill the urn, check the milk, put cakes and snacks on plates).



The quilting projects we worked on ranged from intricate machine piecing, through hand and machine appliqué, exquisite embroidery, and hand quilting. At least eight of the twenty participants sat around draped in their gorgeous guilts as they made them even better with their hand stitching. Whether it was fine cotton or the thicker Perle thread, each quilt became prettier and prettier as the weekend progressed.

There was much discussion of technique, hoops (some didn't use them), footstools, aching backs, thimbles (that lasted a couple of hours) needles, batting, eyesight, quality of cotton and knots, knots, knots.

Luckily, we were able to take breaks and marvel at how quickly and beautifully some machine quilt tops were made. There was also appliqué done every which way and the embroidery work was spectacular. I think we all came away with many new quilting tips and tricks to add to our repertoires.

WOW on the ten minute "Pop up Project" we couldn't believe how easy it was and how lovely it turned out. (No...not telling. You had to have been there).

The food was delicious. The new caterer for the Friday night dinner was more than generous and some of us were able to save our lunch money and tuck in to the leftovers. Our night at the Pub on the Saturday (lovely food once again) ended up with every one meandering back early to make some progress on their projects. LOL. We are SUCH party animals!

We relaxed, we sewed, some stayed up late, some rose early and everyone made a few new friends.

Big thanks go to Cindy and her hardworking team for organising a weekend that was so relaxed it motivated everyone to sew, sew, sew.

SHOW AND TELL



(1) BIRTHDAY QUILT - Heather Bingham Heather has used small squares previously assembled from scraps to make this centre. The strippy borders come from her stash. Her friend will be very pleased to receive this gift for her 60th birthday. Heather machine guilted it.

(2) THREE LITTLE ROBINS - Janet Kidson Janet's quilts are always a delight. The little robins are photo printed onto previously dyed fabric. Janet's husband, Mal, is the expert photographer. The photos are beautifully placed in square-on-square blocks in a central strip. The lateral border

strips use Leesa Chandler fabrics, two prints merged with fussy cutting and raw edge appliqué. Commenced in December 2016 and finished, January 2017.

(3) SWEETHEARTS - Lisa King This beautiful quilt in muted colours was commenced at Somerset Patchwork Summer School in 2016. The pattern is by Sue Ambrose. It is hand pieced and hand appliqued. There is so much detail in this lovely guilt and it deserves a closer look. Toile fabric is used as background in some strips which

adds interest. The muted greys and blues have a calming effect. There are many strips of

different blocks, nine patches, diamonds and others. Machine quilted by Karen Styles. Started and completed in 2016.



(4) THE RED CENTRE - Lisa King.

This quilt was made for the Australian Textile Exhibition at Cranbourne Australian Botanical Gardens. The centre medallion depicts the red desert centre. It is surrounded by interesting machine pieced borders. The squares on point and the flying geese blocks are strong borders. The largest border has an interesting story. Lisa found two panels each with a painted circle in cream, taupe and brown. She was able to fussy cut them and place them in the border so it reads on the quilt as a large oval. It really suits the theme of the quilt and reminds me of tracks depicting pathways seen on Aboriginal paintings. It really works with the red centre. You never know what you might find fossicking around in fabric shops. That strangely marked fabric you had nearly given up on might be just the sparkle you need in your next project.

This is a small but excellent group of quilts. Keep working on the UFO's which are always lurking in the background. We need to see them in Show and Tell. Jeanette Widdows.
