You know you're a quilter when...

your walls have no room for pictures, because they're covered with wallhangings.



Our guest speakers, Fran Snowden and Glenice Hopes, brought an amazing array of their creations topped up with their passion for their cause. The term generally used to describe their genre is Fiddle (Sensory) rugs. Fran and Glenice met at the Seville community house in late 2015 – Glenice has a 16-year background in diversionary therapy for disabled children and adults. Fran has a granddaughter with multiple disabilities for whom she had knitted a big blanket which provided sensory



therapy.

Together they began creating their sensory wonders and invited other craftspeople of the Yarra Valley to assist – they were overwhelmed.

Their first exhibition of these delights was held in October, 2016 at Mont de Lancey homestead at Wandin North. They gave away 300 items to people from various backgrounds (children from special schools, nursing homes). Fran and Glenice discovered that not only was there an enormous need for these goodies, but also the process touched an emotional chord with visitors.

I was amazed at the type and variety of goods created – touchy feely muffs knitted from fluffy yarn with smooth, knobby feely items ‘hidden’ inside the muff; or a board with a power point to switch on and off with perhaps another type of switch which twists or perhaps a flap with a knob. Other boards had fleece and twisty timber handles attached. There were small (about A4) fabric pads/rugs with zips of various sizes and colours which can be opened and closed – other mats had buttons of various sizes sewn over them. Knee rugs decorated with ribbons of various colours, widths and fabric type. Fiddle sleeves – these are knitted sleeves with a cuff and an ‘arm’ to above the elbow, finished off with another cuff. These work on the ‘out of sight out of mind’ theory for those who require an IV, but can’t resist the need to remove or fiddle with it. As Fran said there is no right or wrong way to make the items – as long as they are safe and the carers make the ultimate decision on suitability. Each item always find a home.

I am sure we were all very impressed with Fran and Glenice’s project; the fact that everyday items which would appear to be ‘useless’ can be crafted into wonderfully useful items for those with special needs [cognitive, dementia, autism] raises the question “How can we help?”

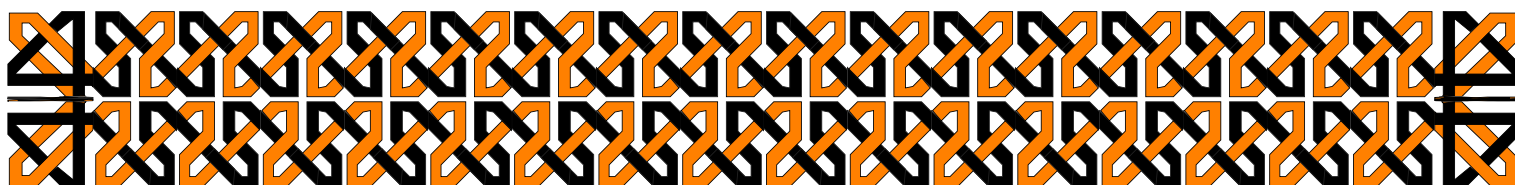

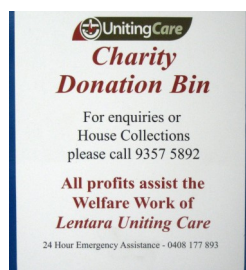
AQA COMMUNITY DONATION PROGRAMS

AQA supports many agencies through our Gift Quilts program. We continue to support Uplift with donations of bras and knickers. Impact is supported with lovely toiletries. They need regular size soaps, hand creams etc rather than travel size. If you have received more of these gifts than you can use please consider donating. Their next big packing day will prepare packs for Christmas as well as emergencies.

At the May General Meeting our guest speakers Glenice and Fran from the Seville Community Centre Dementia Support and Learning Groups. They showed us a huge eclectic display of items made for children and adults who are living with a range of challenging conditions such as autism and dementia and other neurological conditions. Such conditions may lead these people to need the comfort of tactile sensations be it a quilt, a rug or something that occupies the hands and mind. The report in this Quilters Patch will cover the talk. As a result, there was overwhelming support and wish to contribute to the generosity of this program.

AQA members who so wish to contribute are encouraged to collect and donate all sorts of sewing and other haberdashery and hardware items. The list is only limited by the imagination. Here are just a very few suggestions: zippers, buckles, large buttons and large studs, lurex through to fur, corduroy, silk and velvet, velcro, rough through to smooth or slippery fabrics, ribbons, laces and braids, gloves, hardware - handles, brushes, switches. Think about colour and the repetitive movement of hands. We also saw knitted sleeves that look like those from a cardigan or jumper for adults and children to cover from view cannula and IV tubes. All items are made by volunteers and donated freely to those in need. So, at each meeting there will be a basket for your generous contributions. Nothing is unsuitable as long as you consider safety. Start setting those items aside and we will ensure they are delivered. Ros

Each Mother's Day weekend a number of A.Q.A Members make the trip to Phillip Island for the annual "Patches" retreat. This year was the 29th one that has been organized by the Patches committee with the majority of these ladies being there from the start. Some of our Members have been going for over twenty years (Allison Farrell and Ros Robinson 24 years).

On arrival Friday afternoon we are warmly greeted and given our room number, name tag and other relevant info, then after unpacking and setting up for your class it's off to somewhere local for dinner. On return we gather in the hall for a formal welcome. The Tutors show what they will be teaching and also put forward possible classes for the following year. Supper is then available in the dining room and you are able to sit and chat or work on hand projects for as long as you like. Last one out turns off the lights.

Sat classes for those participating begin at 8am, there is also the opportunity to do Social and work on your own projects. Many take the opportunity to purchase fabric and accessories from Sandy and Sue's shop, view next year's classes and fill out an expression of interest form over the weekend. Sunday morning we are able to sleep in a little with breakfast at 8am. We are greeted at breakfast with a gift from the committee. Classes resume at 9am and finish at lunchtime. The weekends also supports the Biggest Morning Tea with a raffle with many generous prizes. More than a thousand dollars was raised. Every participant also receives a show bag of goodies sometime during the weekend (130 attendees this year).

After lunch we meet in the Gym for Show and Tell and the drawing of the major raffle, a Brother Sewing Machine. It is then time to say our goodbyes and lots of See you next year before heading home. Thank you to the Patches Committee for organizing such a wonderful weekend.

SEWING TIP (Courtesy of NOTY)

If you are having trouble getting the blue marks from a water soluble marker to disappear from your quilt, mix up a solution of 1 litre water to 1 teaspoon baking soda. Spray this on those same marks and they will disappear—not to return. This solution will neutralise the colour.
