2 Cuddle Quilts by Diana Cockburn (1 and 2). Two small quilts by Diana, who is attempting to use up her stash! Pink and grey pastels, 9 patch blocks. The quilts are for the AQA gift quilt program. Machine quilted and pieced.

Alexa Collins has created a super quilt top called 'Dashing Everywhere' (3). She has used 1000 x 2 ½ inch

squares acquired in a block swap, organised by Faye Eaton. Alexa discovered a large Churn Dash pattern and decided to create her own version. The complex result has far greater impact then the usual churn dash block quilt. The background was purchased from the October 62017 Market Day and successfully pulled it all together. Machine pieced. Commenced in 2017; quilting to be completed?

3 'Darcy's Quilt' (4) Julie Langford exhibited a cute and colourful quilt made for lucky 5 week old Darcy. Julie set herself a challenge to make the quilt in special colours, using only the fabrics from her

stash. Haven't we all tried this challenge! The quilt may not be needed for a few months but meantime, it is sure to brighten up the nursery. The quilting has a trail of elephant footprints that wander over the quilt as the quilting pattern; perhaps the appliqued elephant wanders softly as the little one sleeps.

4 Mary Wheeler's quilt (5) has the ubiquitous title 'Scraps'; but she has skilfully used colours (plains/patterns) and placement design that determine the success of the quilt. Inspired by Diane Routt, who suggested cutting up scraps into usable shapes, Mary now has boxes of squares and triangles. Anything goes! What a stunning result using the solids and repeat squares to form a chequerboard pattern. Sage advice from Diane has paid off and could be inspiration for others. The project is all hand pieced. Commenced and completed in 2017.

Diana Cockburn's third quilt (6) is called 'I Spy Pussy Cats'. **7a** She was using up her red and pink stash and came across the cat fabric so made great use of it. Sure to please a cat lover out there who receives it as part of the AQA gift quilt program. All machine pieced and quilted. Started November 2017 and finished yesterday.

'Harlequin' is the name of Judy Robinson Whitty's quilt (7). Eleven years in the making, this quilt started with a huge square in a square, in a square. It was then cut into four and pieced on-point. This design idea

required some time to germinate but was worth the wait. We all agree that the backing fabric is one of those fabrics that you just cannot cut up. Sunny shades of yellow, orange, vibrant pink and purple; custom dyed fabric (7a). Machine pieced and quilted. Commenced 2007 and completed 2018.

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
Join us again for a fun filled weekend of laughter, sewing, food and shopping in Queenscliff.

GUEST SPEAKER FOR FEBRUARY—LEESA CHANDLER



Leesa was our Guest Speaker on February 5^{th.} She has been involved in Patchwork for the past 30 years, she loves teaching everything from appliqué, quilts to handbags, traveling and designing her own range of fabrics, all in various colourways, and all using Australian flora motifs. Nearly all her fabrics are manufactured in Japan and are of the highest quality.

Leesa and her husband run their business from Braeside called Chandler's Cottage, specialising in Japanese and Australian style fabrics, together with solids and other styles including Robert Kaufman designs.

Leesa brought with her many samples including Quilts, Bags, Scarves and Dresses. She talked about her ranges named Melba, Under the Australian Sun, Passage to India, Dutch Cottage and Anastasia. Melba has drawn from influences such as William Morris and Liberty.

BOOK REVIEW

Machine Embroidered Quilting and Applique

I borrowed this book from the local library, because I thought it looked interesting; when I got it home, I found it was not what I thought, as it was instructions for making quilt-as -you-go quilts using a programmable embroidery machine. However, there is quite a bit that can be adapted for free-motion quilting techniques, in particular, the idea of doing applique shapes by placing the piece of fabric on the background-quilted sandwich and sewing the shape required. You then carefully trim around the shape to leave the raw-edge appliqued shape. You can layer several colours or shapes to make any effect you desire.

The book is also a good source for free-motion stitches and effects.

Hints I have collected from the internet.

How To Get Gobs Of Vliesofix, Polyester Off an Iron Before You Have to Press a Shirt:

Step 1. Take it into the kitchen.

Squeeze some dishwash detergent into a small bowl with some warm water.

Dip one of those green plastic washing up scrubber thingies into the bowl.

Scrub the soleplate gently but persistently. I am continually amazed at how much comes off by this method.

If it is all off - rinse with clean water on a clean soft cloth.

Step 2 - for the stuff that didn't come off with Step 1.

Rinse the bowl and green scrubber.

Put some white vinegar into the bowl.

Using a clean cloth dipped into the vinegar scrub the soleplate.

If this has worked - rinse with clean water on a clean soft cloth.

Step 3 - for really baked on gunk that still hasn't come off

In a saucepan heat up some white vinegar and salt.

Heat until the salt has all dissolved.

When it is warm dip the cloth into it and scrub the soleplate yet again.

Rinse all the cleaning stuff off with clean water.

If the iron is still a disaster area buy a new el cheapo iron for using with fusibles

(I got mine from Target for \$14) and another for ironing shirts and trousers.

Keep them in different rooms with separate ironing boards (cheaper than new trousers);

invest in a new box of Glad Bake and resolve to use it under and over every time you fuse in future.



Quilters Survival Basket

This makes a great gift. Place all the items along with a print out of what each item represents in a small basket. Then use cellophane and a ribbon to seal the basket.

• Magnifier: Remember to never blow your mistakes out of proportion.

• Finger protector: To remember that you are wrapped up in this wonderful piece of work...Enjoy!

• Toothpick: to remember not to be too picky about your work just relax and do it.

• Paper clips: to help hold things together such as patterns.

- Spool of quilting thread: to help tie up the loose ends.
- Eraser: to wipe away the mistakes you make
- Rubber Band: so you can stretch beyond your current ability.

• Mounds candy bar: to give you mounds of encouragement in your work

- Jelly Beans: for all the colors in your creations
- Pen and Journal: to write down new ideas and record the old ones
- Hand lotion: to ease the pain from the tired hands after a hard days work
- between needles: for all your sharp ideas
- Safety pins: just like your basting you are holding it all together
- Piece of batting: to remind you to seek out a comfortable place to work
- Several pieces of remnants: to show out of a little comes wonderful things
- Disposable camera: picture all your hard work finished
- Lollipop: lick all those tough stitches
- Aspirin: for all those harder projects to come
- Chocolate: for all the breaks you will need
- Careful gum: to remind you to have fun while you work
- Batteries: so you will keep going and going and going

• Teabag: have a cup of tea and relax you did a wonderful job on the quilt!

Some of these are just a joke, of course, but a basket of oddments to help in emergencies might be a good idea for you or a friend. I'd suggest including the things that so often disappear when you need them, like spare machine needles, seam ripper, rotary cutter blades, thread snipper, etc.

An idea as a present for a quilter who is going travelling is a daisy wheel thread cutter (as these are allowed on planes) and a suitable bag or case to hold the work in progress.
